## MESSAGE

2018 saw several positive developments for advocates working on SRHR in Asia and the Pacific. India overturned a colonial-era law, known as section 377, under which gay sex is categorized as an “unnatural offence”, and also criminalized [sexual acts or intercourse with a minor wife \(under age 18\) as rape](#). In Pakistan, the Senate passed a Transgender Rights Law. And the New Zealand government made a long awaited decision to remove abortion from the Crimes Act and treat it as a health issue. At the same time, there has been a trend of shrinking space for civil society (CS) affecting the ability of civil society to operate in several countries of the region.

This year was an exciting one for APA which brought our network together for the ‘Catalyzing CSO Action for Sexual Rights in Asia Pacific’ meeting. Members had the opportunity to network and discuss how to engage with regional and global processes and use the tools of the international human rights system for the fulfilment of sexual rights.

The midterm review of the 2013 Asian and the Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development was another key event where APA members worked together to advocate for SRHR and accountability, highlight the SRHR needs of marginalized groups across the region, and connect with government representatives. A number of country statements at the meeting reaffirmed the Ministerial Declaration,

and highlighted the need for universal access to and the importance of sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR). Agreement for a regional monitoring framework to be further developed in 2019 was an outcome from the meeting.

This year also saw new leadership for APA, as Jackie Edmond from Family Planning New Zealand stepped down after successfully guiding APA for six years. We are grateful for her years of support and leading us through a period of transition. Shama Karkal of Swasti took the position of Chair at the Steering Committee meeting of September 2018.

## WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

In 1994, 179 governments adopted a revolutionary Programme of Action (PoA) in Cairo at the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD). ICPD was innovative in its call for women's sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights to be prioritized in sustainable development efforts.

APA was established as a CSO-led network that supports civil society action to push the ICPD agenda domestically and internationally. Over the last two decades APA has galvanised national and regional advocacy from its coordinating office in Bangkok, Thailand to further SRHR, gender and human rights at regional and international fora.

### WHO WE ARE

Asia Pacific Alliance for Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (APA) is a network of national, regional and global civil society organizations that advocate for the fulfillment of sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) for all persons in the Asia Pacific region

### WHAT WE DO

APA's mission is **to mobilize civil society advocacy across the region to hold governments and other stakeholders accountable for their obligations and commitments to realize the SRHR of all persons in Asia and the Pacific.**

APA prioritizes issues such as sexuality, access to comprehensive sexuality education, and access to safe and legal abortion.

### HOW WE DO IT

APA uses two main strategies to achieve its mission: regional advocacy and capacity building. APA and our members advocate at national, regional and global fora to ensure inclusion and uptake of CS priorities; encourage transparency and participation of governments and monitor review processes including Agenda 2030, ICPD, the Beijing Platform for Action, Universal Periodic Review and Human Rights Treaty Bodies for progress on SRHR commitments.

# 2018 IN A GLANCE

With strong commitment towards empowering SRHR champions (SRHR), APA mobilizes civil society, including community organizations, for advocacy on sexual rights issues in Asia Pacific, encourages active civil society participation, and works to increase opportunities for CSOs in the region's developing countries to participate in national, regional, and global review processes.

This year, APA organized and co-organized a number of capacity building events and partnered with key actors and stakeholders to strengthen regional alliances and advocacy for policy development and fulfilment of SRHR.

We also continued our steps towards improving services to our members and to amplify the impact of our network's capacity building and advocacy work.

2018 gave greater focus on the regional and global policy process as key entry points for sexual rights advocacy. Much of our work is aimed at equipping civil society with knowledge, capacity, and opportunity to bring their voices at these processes.

Our network also grew this year. We were joined by three organizations committed to advancing SRHR in Asia Pacific..

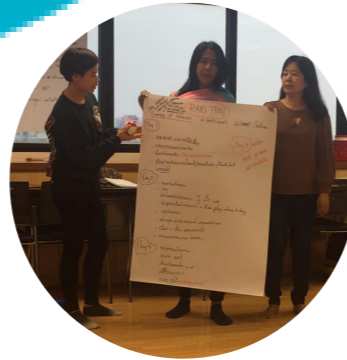

# MOBILIZING CIVIL SOCIETY

Partnerships. Capacity Building. Regional Advocacy.

**APA, as a regional network, continues to be a collective voice working towards making Asia Pacific governments and other stakeholders accountable to the commitments they made to make sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) a reality for all. We believe that the keys to strong, effective regional advocacy that delivers life-changing SRHR policies are partnerships and a pro-active civil society that is well-equipped with knowledge and skills in advocacy.**

In 2018, we worked with local, national, regional and global organizations that share the same vision and mission of mobilising civil society around their sexual and reproductive health and rights. Our partnerships produced capacity-building events that amplify and strengthen the impact of our national and regional SRHR advocacy.

APA also contributes to regional and global coalitions and listserves to ensure that Asia Pacific SRHR issues are being prioritized and that members are kept updated on

developments, including the Asia Pacific Regional CSO Engagement Mechanism and Thematic Working Group on Gender, Sexuality and SRHR; the CSO Steering Committee for the Midterm Review of the 2013 Asia Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development; the Women's Major Group; and the International Sexual and Reproductive Rights Caucus (ISRCC).

**Here's a summary of our efforts to mobilize civil society action for SRHR:**

## 1 | WE HAD TWO PROJECT PARTNERSHIPS AIMED AT ADVANCING THE FULFILLMENT OF SRHR IN THE ASIA-PACIFIC REGION

**“CSO Activism for Sexual Rights in Asia Pacific”** Project funded by the Swedish Association for Sexuality Education (RFSU) that aims to mobilize and organize discriminated and excluded groups in the region to around their rights, in specific SRHR, to influence policy development and monitoring of commitments.

This project aims to ensure that the right to bodily autonomy is fulfilled for marginalized and/or discriminated groups in Asia and the Pacific is fulfilled. Activities include project launching, capacity building opportunities, APA members' participation to regional and global processes, and APA's institutional development. (Refer to the section HOW WE DELIVER for project accomplishments.)

## “Strengthening the Leadership of Marginalized Women and Girls”

Activity-based project funded by the Embassy of Australia Direct Aid Programme and delivered in cooperation with Theater for a Change to empower marginalized women and girls in Thailand through building capacity in leadership and facilitation.

This five-day rights-based workshop aimed to increase leadership and facilitation capacities of marginalized women and girls, build confidence, and introduce a set of skills and tactics to be used by participants in the course of their work. Delivered in cooperation with Theatre for a Change, the workshop had 19 participants representing the following communities: women / girls living with HIV, sex workers, LGBT, women who use drugs, women who have undergone abortion, and migrant women / girls.



## 2 | WE ORGANIZED EVENTS AND OPENED OPPORTUNITIES FOR IMPROVED KNOWLEDGE, INCREASED CAPACITY, AND STRONGER ADVOCACY

### “Connecting the Dots: Sexual and Reproductive Justice and the Achievement of Sustainable and Resilient Societies”

A workshop at the preparatory Asia Pacific People's Forum on Sustainable Development (APFSD) aimed at providing an overview of linkages between SRHR and Sustainable and Resilient Societies, and to put a “face” on systemic barriers to Sexual and Reproductive Justice. Organized in cooperation with International Planned Parenthood Association (IPPF) South Asia Regional Office (SARO); Womens Global Network for Reproductive Rights (WGNRR); Asia Pacific Coalition on Male Sexual Health (APCOM).

**“Towards resilient and sustainable societies: Health and well-being of women and young people”** A UNFPA APRO-led side event focused

on the 2018 Asia Pacific People's Forum on Sustainable Development (APFSD)/ High- Level Political Forum (HLPF), in cooperation with the Thematic Working Group on Sexuality, Gender and SRHR of the RCEM.

**“Strengthening the Leadership of Marginalized Women and Girls”** A rights-based workshop for marginalized women and girls in Thailand.

**“Catalyzing CSO Action for Sexual Rights in Asia Pacific”** Launching of “CSO Activism for Sexual Rights in Asia Pacific” project with RFSU, and strategic meeting with APA members. It also served as preparation for the Midterm Review (MTR) of the 2013 Asian and Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development (APMDPD).

### WE PROVIDED OUR MEMBERS WITH KNOWLEDGE PRODUCTS RELEVANT TO THEIR REGIONAL SRHR ADVOCACY

Alongside the APA strategic meeting, Guttmacher-Lancet Commission organized the Asia launch of their seminal publication **“Accelerate progress—sexual and reproductive health and rights for all: report of the Guttmacher–Lancet Commission”** on 13 September.

A series of 7 factsheets called **“From Commitment to Action A Factsheet on Implementing the 2013 Asia and Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development”** targeting key constituencies developed by APA was distributed to APA members and partners in preparation for Midterm Review of 2013 Asian Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development.

### PARTICIPATION AND INVOLVEMENT AT REGIONAL AND GLOBAL MEETINGS

#### 51st Session of the Commission on Population and Development

The Commission reviews the progress in the implementation of the (ICPD) PoA. APA made CSO Statement in cooperation with Family Planning New Zealand at the 51CPD, which had the theme of “Sustainable cities, human mobility and international migration” in 2018.

#### The Asia-Pacific CSO Forum “Charting the Way Forward”

Preparatory meeting for the Midterm Review of 2013 Asian Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development (APMDPD). In particular to advance gender equality and universal access to sexual and reproductive health and rights with approximately 70 participants from across the region. APA was on the CS Steering Committee and led the Participation Working Group.



APA member Lloyd Nunag of Youth Coalition delivering the first of three consolidated CSO statements at the Midterm Review of 2013 Asian Pacific Ministerial Declaration on Population and Development. As part of our commitment to our members, we made sure that our project delivery includes **capacity and knowledge building, opportunity for participation at regional and global mechanisms,** and our own **institutional development** that allows us to improve our service delivery and value-contribution.



## SHORT-TERM RESULTS WE SAW

APA members enjoyed improved access to information through APA's communication channels, and found it useful in their advocacy work, according to an internal survey.

We facilitated the exchange of information (internally and externally) as well as expertise within the network, and improved access to strategic information on policy and legal developments and to resources and tools to monitor SRHR implementation.

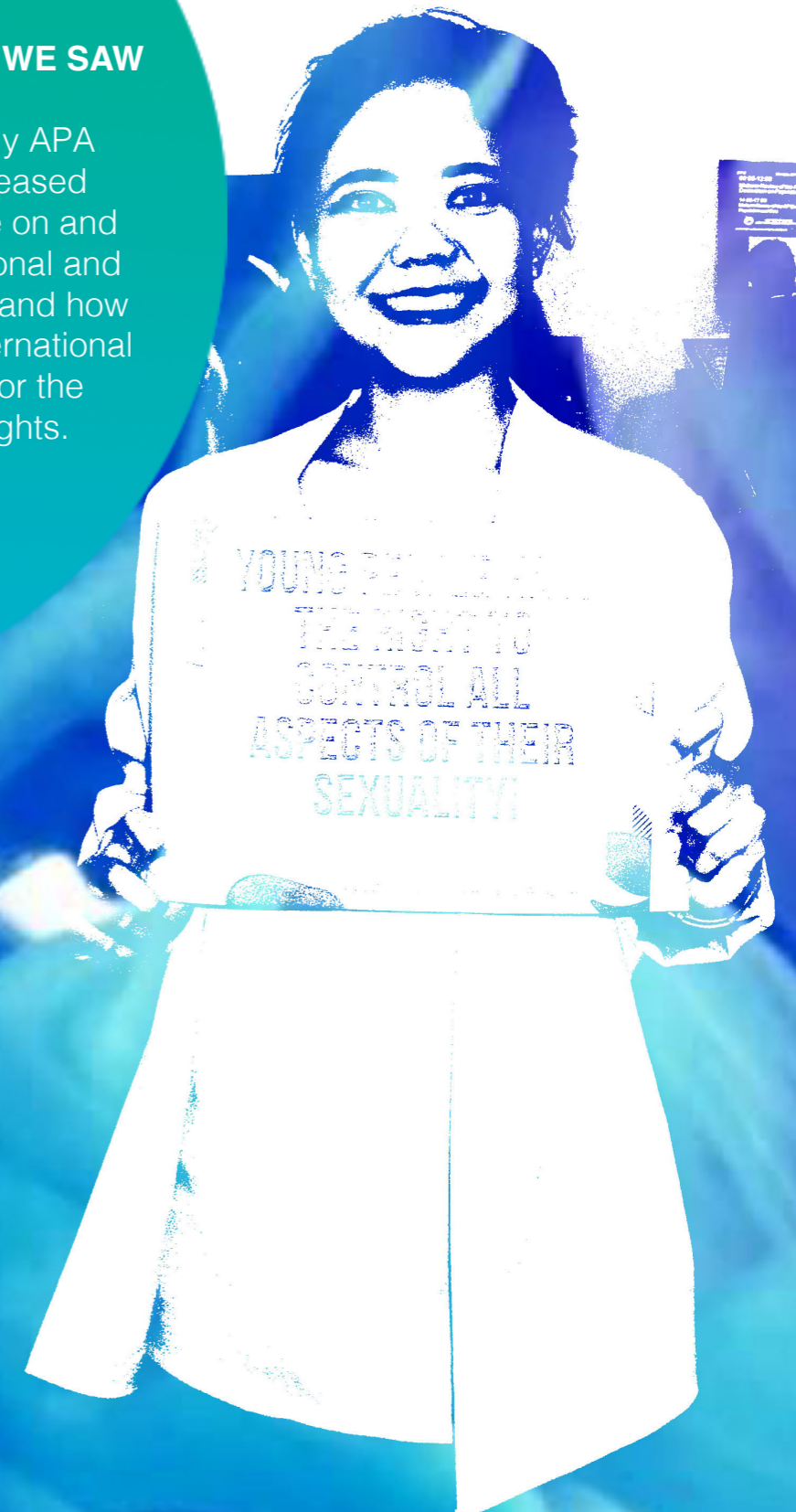

APA and its members were engaged and mobilized in regional SRHR advocacy through:

- Delivery of a joint statement during the 51st Commission on Population and Development in collaboration with an APA member.
- Mobilizing participation of members in the preparatory CS forum and the 5th Asia Pacific Forum on Sustainable Development
- Serving on the Civil Society Steering Committee for the MidTerm Review of the 2013 APMDPD, leading the working group on CS participation, and facilitating the participation of 6 members
- Providing input to the Asia-Pacific Regional Expert Group Meeting on Reviewing Implementation of Commitments from the Asia-Pacific Intergovernmental Meeting on HIV and AIDS Beyond 2015 on 27 November at UN ESCAP and ensuring a gender perspective.

# STEPPING UP

In 2018, APA took concrete steps to improve its service to its member organizations and individual members through improvement in the quality, relevance and access of information shared within the network, and through election for representation on APA's Steering Committee.

### KNOWLEDGE MANAGEMENT TOOLS:

APA developed a new database aimed at improving and facilitating exchange of information and resources within the network. Aside from knowledge products, the database holds information about the work and priorities of other members.

A quarterly newsletter is shared with members of the APA network, which highlights global, regional and national policy and legal developments and advocacy opportunities related to SRHR, as well as sharing updates on the work of APA members across the region.

And work began on a new website for the alliance at the end of 2018. We are committed to strengthening our internal and external network communications, including upgrading to an intuitive and functional website that can serve as an external repository of knowledge products.

Together, the APA organizational website and social media tools function to strengthen cooperation, networking and advocacy of members and partners through the exchange of information, tools and global, regional and national developments in SRHR.

### GOVERNANCE

APA, is governed by a 7-member international Steering Committee (SC) The APA SC met once in 2018, on 11 September in Bangkok, Thailand. At this meeting a new Chair was nominated, Shama Karkal from Swasti Health Catalyst, and our first youth representative joined the SC, Lloyd Nunag from Youth Coalition for Sexual and Reproductive Rights.

This year an election was also held for representation on APA's SC, as part of a

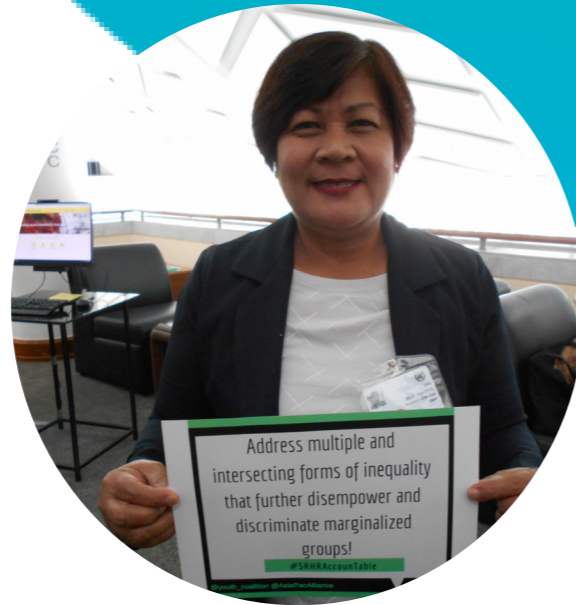
transition to a new sub-regional governance model, whereby:

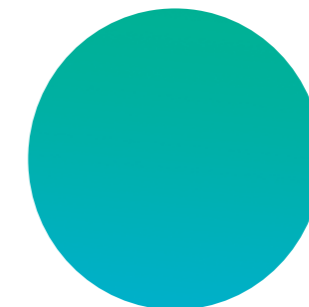
